

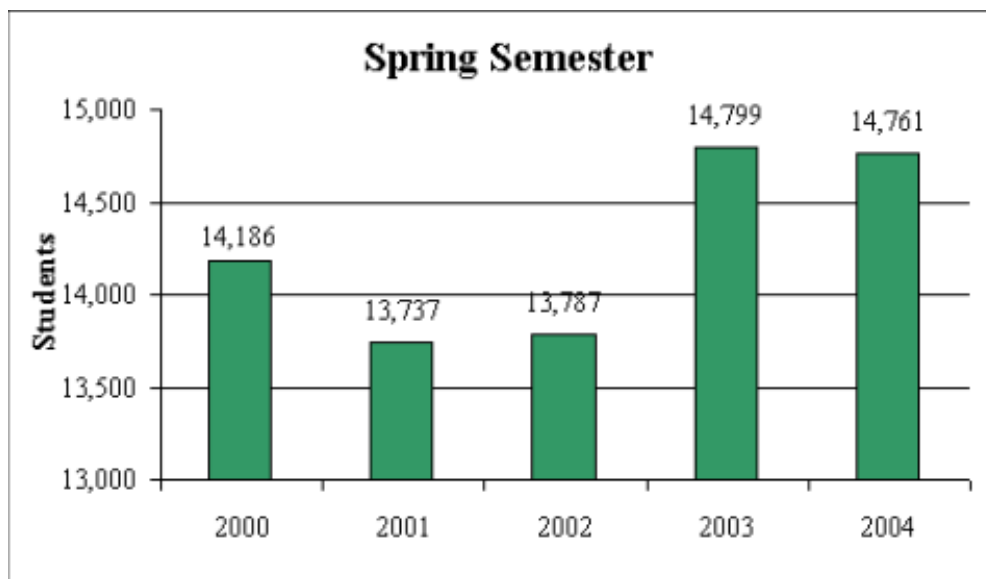


Semester Registration Report Spring 2004

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Longitudinal Enrollment

Southeastern's total student enrollment decrease by 0.3% from the Spring 2003 semester to the Spring 2004 semester. This reflects a 1.1% decrease in undergraduate enrollment and a 4.9% increase in graduate enrollment. Graduate enrollment includes students in Alternate Certification Programs.

Full-time Equivalent (FTE) Students Taught

The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) students taught decreased 0.6% from the Spring 2003 semester to the Spring 2004 semester. (Note: These FTE calculations are based on the undergraduate and graduate hours taught by departments. These calculations will differ from FTE calculations based on the student classification of undergraduate and graduate.) The number of full-time equivalent undergraduate students equals the total undergraduate student credit hour (SCH) production divided by 12, and the number of full-time equivalent graduate equals the total graduate SCH production divided by 9.

Average Course Loads

The average course load of undergraduate students is 13.3 hours which is the same as in Spring 2003. The average course load for graduate students (including Alternate Certification students, Master's plus 30, and Extended Studies students) is 5.8 hours, which is a decrease from 5.9 in Spring 2003. In Spring, a full-time undergraduate student is enrolled in 12 or more hours and full-time graduate students in 9 or more hours. Part-time undergraduate students are enrolled in less than 12 hours and graduate students in less than 9 hours.

Top Six Parishes

The six parishes which most of Southeastern's Louisiana resident students claim as a home parish are the parishes listed in the table below. With 3,385 students, Tangipahoa is the most represented parish. Ascension Parish replaced Washington Parish as the sixth parish this Spring. Compared to Spring 2003, Jefferson Parish had the largest increase in undergraduate enrollment with 5%, an increase of 29 students. Livingston Parish had the largest percent increase in graduate students with an increase of 26 students or 11%

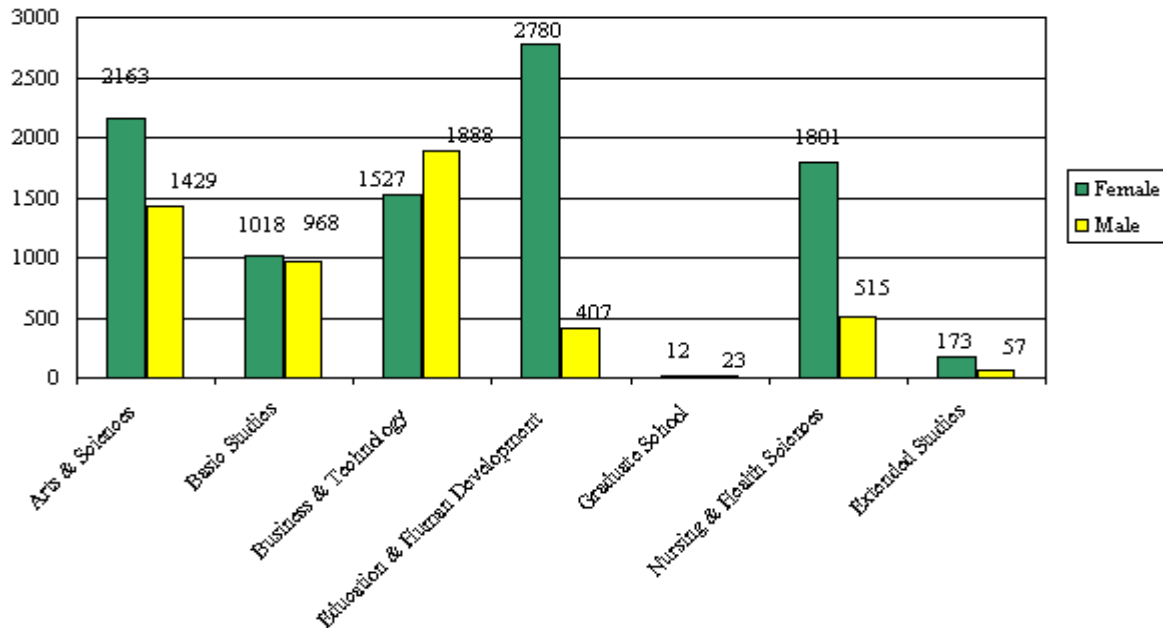
