### Louisiana Economy

Total state employment for the third quarter of 2016 fell by 0.6 percent from the previous quarter and was down 1.9 percent from 3Q2015.

The statewide labor force for 3Q2016 fell 0.7 percent from the previous quarter and 1.8 percent from 3Q2015.

The similar year-over-year declines in both employment and the labor force led to the unemployment rate being the same in 3Q2016 as in 3Q2015 (6.1 percent).

Changes in state sales tax rates and exemptions by the 2016 Legislature led to increased sales tax collections in 3Q2016 of 35.9 percent compared to 3Q2015. However, state sales tax collections were down 6.3 percent from the previous quarter.

Seasonally-adjusted state personal income increased 0.5 percent from the second quarter of 2016 and 1.2 percent compared to 3Q2015. Year-over-year, net earnings increased 0.1 percent, dividends, interest, and rent 1.3 percent, and personal transfer receipts 4.7 percent.

Industries contributing the most year-over-year growth in earnings from 3Q2015 to 3Q2016 were *Health care and social assistance* (+\$698 million), *Government and government enterprises* (+\$356 million), and *Finance and insurance* (+\$326 million).


Industries with the largest year-over-year declines were *Mining* (-\$1.2 billion), *Transportation and warehousing* (-\$624 million), and *Durable goods manufacturing* (-\$445 million).




## Immediate Impacts of the Flood of August 2016 on Livingston Parish Employment and Wages: by Industry


### Effects of the August 2016 Flood on Employment within Livingston Parish

## Washington Parish

The number of employed Washington Parish residents in the third quarter of 2016 fell 0.6 percent compared to the third quarter of 2015. The labor force also contracted by 0.6 percent, resulting in no change to the unemployment rate (7.8 percent).

Sales tax collection data were not available for Washington Parish for 3Q2016.

Building permits for 24 homes were issued in 3Q2016, up 9.1 percent from 22 in 3Q2015.


The number of Washington Parish homes sold in 3Q2016 (37) was down 26.0 percent from 3Q2015, but the average price was up 5.3 percent, resulting in a year-over-year decrease in total home sales volume of 22.1 percent.

Washington Parish residents purchased 332 new cars and light trucks in 3Q2016, a decline of 17.4 percent from 402 in 3Q2015.

### LSBDC at Southeastern coaches millennials on starting businesses

The Louisiana Small Business Development Center hosted the Northshore Millennial Meetup on November 17, 2016. The event was a conversation between the students and members of LSBDC on various aspects of business. Millennials gathered in the Student Union first floor to discuss some of their business ideas and to gain more knowledge on the business environment. The event was focused on this demographic.

"Our National Association of Small Business Development Centers was doing research on what businesses are growing and what kind of customers are growing businesses, the whole small business model and how it is changing with the millennial," said Director of LSBDC William Joubert. "A bunch of the centers got together, and we talked about how we can reach them, the millennial generation."

The association decided that having direct conversations with the students was the way to move forward.

"We said, 'Why don't we do a series of conversations because the students don't typically want to walk into an institution making appointments to talk to some people who have some experience,'" said Joubert. "The idea was 'Well, if they're not coming to us, let's go to them.'"

The students attending the event were not only from business backgrounds. Students with different majors came in to the meetup as well.

"I think this is a really beneficial event, especially for college students, because when you go to college, most of it is about getting a degree," said Matthew Dyson, a sophomore engineering technology major. "But then, there's some students who want more. Some students go to college to learn how to do certain things that they can apply towards their dream whether it's building a business or something that could change the world."

"This is our maiden voyage," said Joubert. "The first time we've done it. We're going to be looking at the feedback we get today and determine what we should be doing next time."
